The APP Launches in Germany

In September of 2009 Glazner provided training for 9 German poets and 3 healthcare workers in using poetry to connect with people living with dementia. Poetry sessions took place in Berlin and Marburg. German poems were identified for the project, training material translated and the launch received press coverage and was the subject of a German Public Radio show. The Alzheimer's Association of Germany has invited the poets to speak at their 2010 conference. The launch has led the U.S. Embassy in Berlin to fund a pilot project in 2010.
